History Marker Celebrating 25 Years of WFLF



WFLF has published *Emerald Coast Review*, a biannual collection of work submitted by local writers, artists and poets, sixteen times. *ECR* provides a record of the area's literary thought over the years. The number of pages varies, depending on

the quality of submissions selected. The standard size of the book is 6 x 9. The covers also provide insight to the times, in particular the image of Hurricane Ivan on Vol. XII designed by Art Giberson. According to Vol. X, the mission of *ECR* is "to review, enhance and foster the creativity of Northwest Florida through a representative anthology of the best regional talent. Submission guidelines:

1. All submissions should in electronic format since the printing and binding process are electronic. Submissions must be in .doc, .rtf or .pdf format. Email entries to

3. Include a brief biography listing full name, profession, published works, special interests, etc. This will appear with your work in final publication.

4. Submissions are read "blind," so do not place your name on the manuscript. Include a separate page with your name, contact information, submission category, and the title of your submission.

5. Fee: \$10 per submission per category, students \$5 per submission per category. Those accepted for publication will receive a free copy of *Emerald Coast Review*. For online submissions and payment click here [Shop](#) .

2013. WFLF accepts original, unpublished works only. We reserve one-time publication rights to work published in *Emerald Coast Review*. All other rights revert back to the author, artist, or photographer.

7. We consider all submissions final. We will not consider rewritten submissions.

8. No simultaneous submissions accepted.

Poetry guidelines:

1. Up to 4 poems, with a maximum of 400 lines total.

2. A single poetry submission = up to 4 poems.

3. Format poem as you would like it to appear in final publication, using 12 pt. Times New Roman font.

4. Electronic submissions must be sent as .doc, .rtf or .pdf format.

Fiction and Nonfiction guidelines:

1. A single fiction or nonfiction submission = 1 story.

2. Typed, double spaced, 12 pt. Times New Roman font, 1" margins on all sides.

3. Include title only (no author name) on upper right corner of each page.

4. Do not number pages.

5. 2,000 words maximum.

6. Flash fiction (500 words or less) accepted.

7. Electronic submissions must be sent as .doc, .rtf or .pdf format.

Artwork/Photographs guidelines:

1. 6 individual images maximum; one per page.

2. A single artwork/photograph submission = 6 images.

3. Black & white only.

4. Present graphic elements exactly as they should appear on printed page.

5. At least 600 pixels.

6. Must be camera ready

7. Electronic submissions must be sent as .jpeg, .bmp or .png format.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I can talk to you about Shakespeare and John Donne and style and substance, but I dare not enter the world of linguistics, diphthongs and whole language. People used to grimace and ask me, "How can you teach high school kids?" Simple: I like teenagers. Also, I didn't want to be responsible for teaching a child to read. If I failed, the child was doomed.

A recent "brain study" email proves I can read text if I have the correct first and last letter of a word. Despite the email, I believe in the value of each and every letter of the alphabet. Granted, some need partners to have meaning. J R, for example, brings memories to people over fifty, while J paired with Z means more to a twenty-something.

The "L" in WFLF's incorporation papers stands for "literary," but an article in the local newspaper described us as a "literacy" organization. 2013 WFLF Student Poetry Contest

Inspired by Florida's Viva 500 celebration, the 2013 Escambia County Student Poetry Contest theme is "My Florida."

According to Susan Lewis, contest coordinator, "students may write about every aspect of their beautiful state, whether it be their home, the beaches, the diverse people and cultures or simply the stunning sunrises and sunsets Floridians are treated to every single day."

The annual contest, sponsored by WFLF, culminates in April, National Poetry Month. Any Escambia County student in grade 1-12 who is enrolled in public, private, or home school programs may enter. The twenty-four winners in six grade categories will read their poems at Books A Million, 6235 North Davis, Pensacola, April 27 at 2 p.m.

First, second and third place winners receive cash prizes. Honorable mention winners receive gift cards. Winning poems are published by WFLF, and student poets are later honored at the book's launch.

Submissions must be typed on 8 ½ x 11 paper, attached to an official "Entry form," and submitted to the Main Library, Community Relations Office, 200 West Gregory St., Pensacola by 5 p.m., April 5. CREATIVE WRITING

Book Review: *The Little Bookstore of Big Stone Gap*

If Wendy Walsh and Jack Beck heard "you're nuts" once, they heard it a hundred times. Yet it's a refrain that keeps the laughter going in Walsh's light-hearted memoir, *The Little Bookstore of Big Stone Gap*. The talk started when the couple turned their backs on the real world and chased a dream. They moved to a small coal-mining town in Appalachia, bought an old house, settled into the second floor and transformed the first floor into a second-hand bookstore. Walsh, an academic, and her husband, a Scottish folk artist, had a mission statement and more than a thousand books between them, but they lacked one essential -- a business plan.

Walsh calls her book "a memoir of friendship, community, and the uncommon pleasure of a good book," but it's more. It's a guide to running a used bookstore on a shoe string, a handbook for dealing with customers, and an inspiration for organizing a grass roots marketing plan. Readers learn the fine points of identifying roach frass (poop) and masking tape damage, as well as a little psychology. Walsh explains when to talk and when to listen to customers. Her husband, she writes, knows precisely when to make a "cuppa" and sit down

with a customer. The couple's personal approach in the age of Amazon and e-readers is a tribute to both their community and bibliophiles everywhere.

Reading the description of their 1903 Edwardian house made me feel as if I'd meandered through the bookstore's rooms, run my fingers across the spines of the books, and wandered outside to the Love Shack for romance titles. The best chapters are about the customers: those replacing books for various reasons and the regulars in the bookstore's evening groups. In the chapter Ceridwen, Walsh tells a touching tale of how a Scottish-themed evening at the bookstore brought happiness to a young boy. The animal anecdotes are memorable, too, especially those of the cats-in-residence and an imposter feline. The bookstore's dog, who always sits on a particular stair, provides some good laughs, too.

The early chapters read quickly, especially the ones when the couple builds the shop's inventory while hiding their personal favorites from the sale shelves. A few chapters wax a bit philosophical, especially the one listing Walsh's top ten used books. However, her use of literary allusions throughout the book is consistent and refreshing.

The Little Bookstore of Big Stone Gap is an adventure tale for readers who cherish the magic of books and a romance for those who love cozy, independent bookstores. But don't count on finding this title in a second hand bookstore -- it's a keeper.
