CREATIVE WRITING

WFLF is saddened to hear of the death of **J. Earle Bowden**. Mr. Bowden, born 1928, was an active member of WFLF in the organization's early years. His writing and drawings were included in *Emerald Coast Reviews* from 1989 – 1999, and his name comes up often as an editor. Here are two excerpts to remember him by.

From "Whisper Out of the Dust"

"Rhoady Rivers, snatch on your glad-rags!"

Hurrying on to her sisterly command, Belle Rivers Sin Baade dabs her moon-round face with a damp bath cloth. She stretches her puffed, pallid jaws, pinches her cheeks and blinks repeatedly. Staring blankly into the cracked mirror, she hates the deepening crevices near her tight brown eyes. "It's the last Sunday meeting. Brother Wiley says he's gonna do what he's been promising for three whole weeks."

"Hold yo' hosses, Belle," Rhoady says. Her shrill voice cuts through the dull whine of the whirring fan blades gusting air through the open-windowed bedroom. "Corset's about to cut

me in two. I think I'll just leave it off. Nobody cares no how. Getting' bigger an ol' heifer."

From the Foreword of the *Emerald Coast Review Volume VII*

Those of us who write know that writing is many things: a) an affliction induced by ego enlargement, b) an obsession, c) brave solitude, d) opening a blood vein, and e) pure, agonizing joy.

Writing is often harmless foreplay for the would-be novelist, poet, (**and**) dramatist. It can be an innocuous obsession: it's a beginning, middle, ending; the peaks and valleys of plot. When finished it can be a story—words weaved into the storyteller's enduring, enriching fabric; words in brevity, larded with the sing-song of poetic chimes and rhymes; the dramatist's words alive in an actor's movement, emotion, and dialogue.

The editors have stitched these threads into the seventh collection of West Florida writers. *Emerald Coast Review VII*, saluting the 10th anniversary of the West Florida Literary Federation, takes its place in the tradition of six previous editions in the mosaic of diverse renditions.
