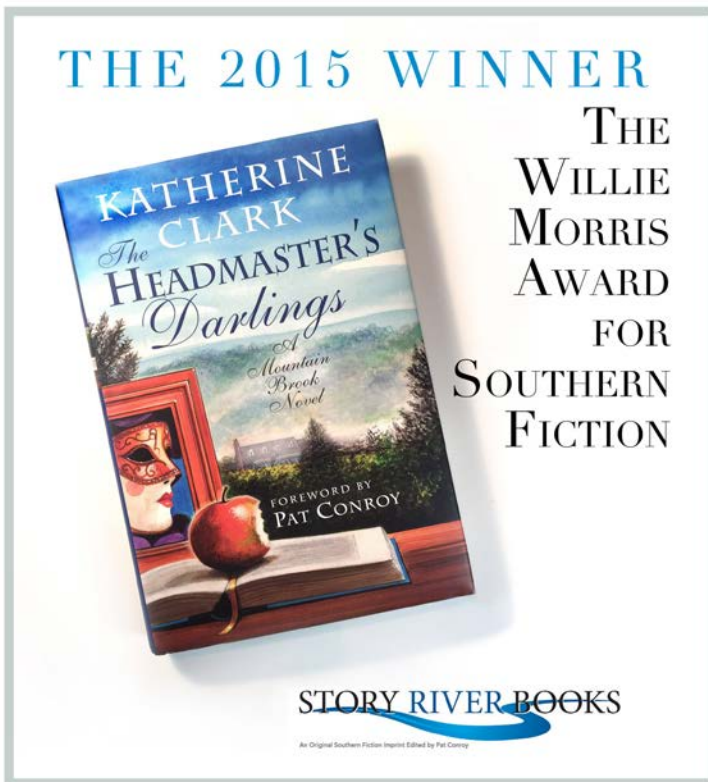

**Review of *The Headmaster's Darlings*  
by Katherine Clark**

ISBN 978-1-61117-538-7 240 pages

Katherine Clark's Mountain Brook novel *The Headmaster's Darlings* introduces readers to Norman Laney, an English teacher and college counselor we won't soon forget. Laney's mission is more far-reaching than teaching English, however. He has invaded the exclusive community outside Birmingham, Alabama, to save it from itself and its burdens of snobbishness, narrow-mindedness, and downright suspicion of the outside world.

Based loosely on a real life teacher and on Clark's own privileged upbringing, the novel boldly addresses social issues of racism and the responsibility that comes with acquiring a higher education. Laney's obvious objective is to prepare his students for college and guide them into the Ivy League Colleges, but his underlying goal is to help them discover their own purpose. When they realize the obstacles they can overcome, they are encouraged to bring it home and make change within the community, thus providing his legacy.

Laney differs from so many teachers we read about in novels in his large physical presence and the way he charms the Southern ladies of Mountain Brook in his effort to make the students think for themselves. Laney's awareness that to guide his students into their own decisions, he must overcome the often overbearing goals of their parents puts him in awkward positions. Nonetheless, he goes about his mission with fervor, convinced he is "civilizing the barbarians." And while readers meet a parade of students, all of whom Laney does his best in his unconventional way to guide, it's his relationships and interactions with the adults that make the story.

Several well-developed characters -- Warren Ritchie, an impossible father whose wife has committed suicide at the beginning of the story, and the school's Headmaster Tom Turbyfill who demands Laney's resignation -- provide conflict and obstacles throughout the year. Turbyfill alludes Laney is accused of something but refuses to give him any details. Herein lies much fodder for introspection.

Clark tells Laney's story with superb dialogue and wit covering one academic year in 1983. Girls who do not wish to be debutantes and ladies who do not read the books for their book clubs all love Norman Laney. Laney himself is a lover of art, travel, theatre and fine food and wine. In these settings, Laney pursues his

goals. Attention to detail places the reader in Mountain Brook. Clark's close look at one facet of Southern society, with its contrast of comedy and darkness, raises awareness and gives the reader pause for thought.

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

A few years before my father died, I decided to preserve some oral history. I have several hours of video of him talking about his life and what it was like to grow up on a farm in south Alabama in the 1930s during the height of the Great Depression. (He was born in 1924). I have videos of him talking about me and my siblings and what it was like to be our father, about his World War II adventures. I have video of him talking about his career and jobs he held. I have similar videos of my mom.

When I tell people this, the most common reaction I get is "I sure wish I had done that with my parents." For those of you for whom it is not too late, it's time for you to start preserving oral history. Here is how to do it using a digital camera (many cell phones will also work.)

1. Get a tripod for the camera so you will not have to worry about holding the camera.
2. Have several charged batteries ready to go as making videos eats up battery life. Have an additional memory card or two as making videos eats up memory.
3. Make a list of many questions to ask: this is important, if you just turn on the camera and say "start talking about your past" that will not work. In my case I asked him about every story I could recall him telling so I could get it on video. I also asked very specific questions like "what did you typically have for breakfast, lunch, dinner on the farm." How did you preserve foods with no electricity, tell me what it was like when the farm finally got electricity, what did you do for entertainment, how did you meet my mom and on and on. Another great question is "Do you have a

message or words of advice to future generations who will see this video?" Specific questions get specific responses. I typed out pages and pages of questions and gave him a copy several days before I started.

4. No matter how thorough you are, you will not ask every question you will later want. To this day, I often think "If I could get five more minutes with dad..."

I have used this treasure trove of material to work on memoirs I am writing about my dad, one story at a time. Eventually, I would like to self publish a book for family members.

If your parent has memory issues, the good news is that the older stuff is the last to go. Dad may not have remembered everything that was said five minutes ago, but he could sure tell you what happened fifty years ago! I urge you not to delay, for when it is too late, it is truly too late.

We will greatly miss board member Susan Feathers as she moves to Tucson, Arizona, to promote her new book *Threshold*, which will be released on November 1. Your vision, hard work and immense grant writing skills have contributed so much to the board and WFLF. You have been granted a leave of absence only, so we do expect you to return! We will keep your board seat warm. This coming Saturday, September 10 at 7 p.m. Susan will read from *Threshold* at Open Books, 1040 N Guillemard Street.
