PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hope you all had a nice Labor Day and at least as of this writing, we have hopefully avoided Hurricane Irma. On Tuesday, September 19th, Open Mic will feature Jack Beverly as he discusses and reads from his new book, *Whistle and Run*. I was in a writer's group with Jack several years ago while he was writing his book. I would eagerly look forward to a new chapter each week of his book in progress. The only downside was that I had to wait a week to find out what happened next, something you will not have to do when you get his book.

The book involves adventure and intrigue and keeps the reader guessing. As one reviewer put it: "*Whistle and Run is a well written urban/adventure tale. The author's style makes it more entertaining than most books of this type. He goes into more detail in each scene which draws the reader more closely to the characters and to the plot as it unfolds*"-- David Schwartz." The plot takes on international dimensions as the action moves to Italy. The author's description of the beautiful Italian countryside and lovely villas shows he knows of what he speaks. Beautiful locations, fine wine and food are interwoven with murderous intent, intrigue and action, a real page turner.

Jack and his wife moved to Pensacola in 1993 as the owners of the New York Deli. He sold the business in 2000 and retired. He volunteers for several organizations including Friends of the West Florida Public Library and the West Florida Literary Federation. While in a writing critique group with Jack, I always found his comments and suggestions to be most helpful.

After his presentation, the audience participation will begin. You will have five minutes to read poetry or prose, sing or dance, do stand-up comedy or showcase your talents/interests in other ways. Open Mic starts at 6:30 pm with wine, food and camaraderie; program begins at 7 p.m.. Hope to see you there.

As previously mentioned, WFLF will once again be participating in the Foo Festival which will be held this coming November. We will be bringing in noted author, humorist and newspaper columnist, Craig Pittman. A former resident of Pensacola, he now resides in Tampa, where he works for the Tampa Bay Times.

His best-selling book is *Oh Florida! How America's Weirdest State Influences the Rest of The Country*. This is truly a fun read. We all knew Florida was weird, this just documents it. Noted comedians and authors Leanna Conley and Erik Decker will also be joining us. In addition, all three will lead a humor writing workshop. STUDENT POETRY CONTEST

What does 7th-grade student Tori Vinson like about writing poetry?

“I like the fact that you can delve into fiction and nonfiction ... and you can use a bit of both, or focus on either, and whatever you do, you can evoke feeling.”

Tori’s poem, “And When the Sun Rises,” is among 54 award winners in WFLF’s 2017 Escambia County Student Poetry Contest, which this year attracted 711 poetry submissions from 26 schools, a sizable increase from last year’s 415 entries from 12 schools.

Student winners will each receive a copy of the WFLF-published book of students’ winning poems at a Book Launch to be held Sept. 16 from 4 to 5 p.m. in the WFLF Board Room at the Pensacola Cultural Center in downtown Pensacola. Books also can be purchased for \$9 each.

WFLF board member and poet Susan Lewis, who has been directing the contest for nine years, is amazed at the creativity of student poets. “We have here 10-year-olds and 14-year-olds that will open their hearts and the wisdom of ages pours out onto the page. You know they will write greatness. The future of my art is secure.”

Teachers, too, view poetry writing as a tool in student development. Cynthia Sarikaya, who has been teaching poetry in the classroom for five years at Tate High School, says writing poetry “strengthens students’ reading and writing skills, which are life skills. They are demonstrating their ability to write about what they are reading or discussing.”

Kathy Garner has been submitting students’ entries to the WFLF student poetry contest for the 15 years she’s been teaching at Episcopal Day School. This year, 30 of the school’s 33 1st and 2nd grade students submitted poems – and between them won all of the 1st and 2nd grade awards. Says Garner: “Writing poetry helps students with clarity of thought; being able to think creatively helps them in their academic pursuit. I am teaching all the elements of poetry all year long.”

Parents are sometimes surprised about what poetry can do for their youngsters’ imaginations. Said Sandy Keating about the poem, “Dark and Light,” written by her son Jacob Weekley, a second-grade prize winner, “It’s very creative. He says some pretty amazing things.” The poem poses a struggle between Dark and Light as to which will prevail. (Of course, they compromised.)

Each year the contest, which has been held since 1987, has a different theme. Says director Lewis, the 2017 theme, “And When the Sun Rises,” was intended to be a pathway out of the darker 2016 theme, “When I’m Alone.” Both themes are meaningful, she says: “Words have the power to walk our youth down some very dark halls and although they learn as they walk, it is our duty as elder poets to teach them the techniques which will enable them to find their way from the darkness, through to the light.” The 2018 theme has not yet been chosen.

After poetry, is there more to explore? Says Tori Vinson, “I tried writing a novel, but it takes a lot more planning, you have to have plot and characters. A poem is both challenging and easy. I do it for fun.” And when the sun rises...
