Join us at the Open Mic on October 18, 2022, at 6:30 p.m. on Zoom!



Meet Our Members:

Charlotte Crane



For nearly 70 years, writing has been a part of who Charlotte Crane is to the core. She shared in her own words her writing journey and history:

“I began as a Wisconsin high school girl reporting small town news for a weekly newspaper during summer break. Then I was a business editor for 26 years for the Pensacola News Journal. This was topped by a decade-long career frosting as Northwest Florida regional correspondent for Florida’s Florida Trend business magazine.

As business editor for PNJ, I was thrilled to introduce readers to new businesses which often evolved into major economic foundations for our area. My work involved outstanding entrepreneurs such as Quint Studer and super-growth employers such as Navy Federal. Hotels, restaurants, shopping centers, factories and beaches. Second to that my content was roadways

leavened by storms, bridge breakage and occasional economic pause. All were exciting. And so was the opportunity to cover regional developments for Florida Trend.

In later years, however, as I completed my full-time employment career, there immersed change. I write now for different formats – converting from factual economics to creative poetry, storytelling, history and memoirs. And for that, for me, Emerald Coast Writers has been a guiding light.

I signed up for classes, exchanging formats with members and teachers, including Katherine Nelson-Born, Jack Beach, Andrea Walker and Diane Skelton – writing veterans who offered reasoning and rhyming to help make participants’ creations better like my own.

I became involved with the ECW structure as well, serving two terms on the board of directors, beginning in 2014, assisting with projects such as Student Poetry Awards and airing the good works through contributing articles for Independent News and Pensacola magazine.

And for my own delight, I wrote poetry and short stories, history and memoirs. My published works include a family memoir, two histories for Pensacola Habitat for Humanity, a co-written history of Escambia United Way and a fiction book called The Tales of Aunt Maddy. Emerald Coast Review also has published several of my pieces.

Of course, every human since the caveman species has felt the need to maintain self and a sideline – as I did. The reason for my family’s move to Pensacola was the foundation of the

University of West Florida, which provided a faculty position for my then husband, Frank Wittwer. Prior to the move, I had received a bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Wisconsin, and later, I earned a master's degree.

I was first introduced to the area payroll by United Way, writing publicity which helped to introduce me to the PNJ position. Close family members today are my son Scott, daughter Ellen and grandson Lucas. My son Brian and the children's father have since passed.

Currently I am working with publisher Linda Wasserman on a book of my poetry and prose. That's exciting too. My other passion besides writing is baking. Friends and strangers sometimes refer to me as the Cookie Lady. My treat prices are reasonable."




Publishing and Member News


